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For the past three years, the Black Women's Business Owners of West Virginia (BWBOofWV) has been a group run majorly through individual contributions from Founder Consandra Leonard; with some additional income from expo fees. Since the start of the group in 2018, the BWBOofWV has grown its engaged business base to over 136 businesses and identified over 82 Black Women Business Owners throughout West Virginia. The BWBOofWV seeks to provide networking, ongoing education, product development assistance, discounts, marketing assistance, mentorships, store development/setup assistance, access to legal assistance, administrative support and much more to small business owners in the state. However in order to do this, we must first take the next step to formalize the Black Women Business Owners of West Virginia. The purpose of this application is to request funds for the BWBOofWV to support the process of establishing itself as 501c(3) non-profit, in order to continue the momentum of the organization's current trajectory in being the top resource for Black Women business owners in West Virginia. Outcomes we hope are looking to achieve with the requested funds: - Secure the WVSUedc studio space on Kanawha Boulevard in Charleston, WV for a period of three years, in order for members to have a consistent location for the organization's future educational meetings and other relevant services. - Support the third annual BWBOofWV Expo with expanded booth rentals for more businesses and more onsite educational services - Contract for BWBOofWV website development that will also host a database of Black businesses in the state - Support for marketing and paid media/ads - Hire a part time organizer to support the planning, coordination, and facilitation of all educational services and large events such as the EXPO - Develop a 12 course educational program titled, the BWBOofWV Access to Business Knowledge Course, where upon completion businesses will receive a completion stipend that can go towards covering their business or other approved start up fees. We would like to make the City of Charleston aware that the Black Women's Business Owners of West Virginia is receiving support and actively making decisions on how we want to incorporate ourselves as a worker owned business, determining our bylaws and operational agreements, and identifying board member prospects.

4. Briefly describe the program/project funds are being requested for:

Secure the WVSUedc studio space on Kanawha Boulevard in Charleston, WV for a period of three years, in order for members to have a consistent location for the organization's future educational meetings and other relevant services. Support the third annual BWBOofWV Expo with expanded booth rentals for more businesses and more onsite educational services. Contract for BWBOofWV website development that will also host a database of Black businesses in the state. Support for marketing and paid media/ads. Hire a part time organizer to support the planning, coordination, and facilitation of all educational services and large events such as the EXPO. Develop a 12 course educational program titled, the BWBOofWV Access to Business Knowledge Course, where upon completion businesses will receive a completion stipend that can go towards covering their business or other approved start up fees.

5. Describe the need for this program/project:

According to the New Economy Initiative, investing in businesses that resource traditionally under-served and underinvested in communities generate not only wealth opportunities but increase overall quality of life. They define underserved communities as those with a history of systemic neglect, racism and structural barriers, having residents with low incomes, more women and more people of color. See New

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Economy Initiative;s "Why Supporting Underserved Small Business Matter" Common barriers include: Limited access to private capital and commercial bank support Little or no family investment or network-based investment Inability to access public dollars (such as SBA loans) Higher insurance costs Public safety concerns and underinvested infrastructure Lack of a professional network Look at leading global investment banking company Goldman Sachs who has recently launched their One Million Black Women Initiative where they are directly investing \$10 Billion to address the dual disproportionate gender and racial biases that black women have faced for generations. They have research supporting that investing in Black Women from childhood to retirement (including job creation and workforce advancement) directly and positively impacts the communities in which they belong.

6. List other Charleston organizations in Charleston that address this need:

African American community members represent almost 20% of Charleston West Virginia's 48,000+ residents. Organizations like the Small Business Association (SBA) have a focus on supporting minority owned small businesses in recovering from social, economic, and other impacts. However, they do this through partnerships with other agencies and businesses. In 2018, the local SBA facilitated an educational training for the BWBOofWV. After the training the facilitator noted that this was the first time she had presented to a group of minority business owners of that size. Therefore, it feels appropriate to say that there are no other organizations in Charleston that can provide access to Black business owners in the area through shared community norms and values. "When resources and assistance are offered, they need to come with trust built on a relationship between the funder and the recipient. Investing in underserved small businesses means investing in people with dreams and hopes for what is possible in their neighborhoods and communities. These people are the best source of wisdom and lived experience." -See New Economy Intiative's "Reaching Underserved Small Businesses"

7. Describe the level of collaboration with other organizations on this program/project:

The Black Women Business Owners of West Virginia will continue its current level of collaboration with the entities and organizations listed in the relationships portion of the application. They will allow the continuation of educational resources and business growth opportunities to current and aspiring business owners in West Virginia. Any additional collaboration will be through paid contracts in order to resource labor for the development of our website and any support for marketing.

8. How will duplication of services be prevented?

The Black Women Business Owners of West Virginia works hard to make sure they collaborate to provide services, increasing access to already existing services, and ensuring resource development is rooted in an identified community need. Starting January 2022, the BWBOofWV first monthly meeting will include an informational survey in order to assess the current needs of the group at large. This information collected will inform what topics will be included at the monthly meetings throughout the year.

Program Requirements and Objectives

1. Identify the target recipients of proposed services. Specify the number of City residents the program will serve during the fiscal year and explain the basis upon which this number is calculated.

For the purpose of this application, the BWBOofWV has estimated that the proposed services will help thousands of people in the Charleston and greater Charleston area. Here is the break down of how the figure was calcuated: The Access to Business Knowledge Courses would serve up to 24 new and existing business owners. However, we considered the outcome of the business that would be represented in the general monthly meetings, the number of businesses selling at the expo, the potential reach through social media engagement, and considered the customer base of each participating business. Overall the BWBOofWV believes we will directly impact 24 or more business owners in the Charleston area while indirectly impacting thousands of city residents who support and/or rely on the business we serve.

Membership and participation with the BWBOofWV is free and open to business owners of all ages, ethnicities, interests and professions with the exception of the BWBOofWB Access to Business Knowledge Courses. These courses will take place twice a year, broken down into semesters, with 12 application slots per semester. Black Women Business Owners of West Virginia Access to Business Knowledge Courses - Submission to Program Requirements In order to live our values, the BWBOofWV will use these classes as a way to directly invest specifically into Black Women Business Owners in the Charleston area. - Must be located or expect to locate your business within the Charleston city limits - Must present your business proposal to the BWBOofWV - Participants who complete 40 hours of study will be awarded a grant amount of \$2000 to go towards applicable business start up fees Proposal will be reviewed by a board subcommittee that will be composed of two board members and a citizen review person who is an active member of the BWBOofWV. No staff will be permitted in the decision making process.

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The structure of the courses with grant stipend after completion is a new activity however some of the resources the BWBOofWV intends to provide during these courses have been provided in the past to general attending memebers. We have helped a number of members legitimize their businesses as well as the example of members being able to leave our monthly meetings with complete budgets, business websites, etc.

4. If this is a new program describe two anticipated measurable outcomes for the proposed program.

1. Increased black owned business ownership in the Charleston area, of which the businesses are set up for success in order to best ensure sustainability of their business in the community. This includes legitimizing current business owners who do not have their state, city license, and other important administrative elements that stand in their way of being their business possibilities. 2. Using this year to secure relationships with sponsors and donors in order to ensure sustainability of both the organization and our annual expos.

We plan to do this through consistent grant researching throughout the year. We will also bring in income through the individual donations, sponsorships for specific programming, and expo fees.

8. Briefly describe the organization's fiscal oversight / internal controls to minimize opportunities for fraud, waste, and mismanagement.

Much like other nonprofits the BWBOofWV will establish a finance board committee that will overview the budget when they meet quarterly. In addition to this we will financially support yearly audits of our annual budgeting to minimize opportunities for fraud, waste, and mismanagement. As well as taking the opportunity for feedback and recommendations about any potential investments or funding resources.

9. How does your agency plan to separate ARPA funds from other agency funds for purposes of identification, tracking, reporting and auditing?

We are currently considering finance record keeping with Quickbooks but are looking into other ideas through market research. The BWBOofWV plans to use Wilcox Bookkeeping and Accounting Tax Services combined with the two plans listed in the previous question.



In February of 2018, Black woman business owner Consandra Leonard noticed a lack of network amongst the Black women business owners in her community. From here, Consandra started to put together the Black Women Business Owners of West Virginia, believing in the role small businesses play in restoring the communities in which they are embedded. In order to build prosperous businesses, the Black Women's Business Owners of West Virginia (BWBO of WV) provides inclusive opportunities for black business women to receive instructional training, education, and networking skills from industry leaders and organizations across West Virginia. The BWBOofWV doesn't just coach business owners. As part of the grain and engagement we leave our members wealthier, smarter, more confident and better equipped to handle changes as a result of working with the organization.

The Black Women's Business Owners of West Virginia's (BWBOofWV) mission is to educate, promote, market, advise and support Black owned businesses. We do this by partnering with local organizations and businesses to bring under-resourced communities resources that will assist them in achieving their small business goals. While the BWBOofWV's mission is to serve as a resource for black owned businesses in West Virginia, we are an organization dedicated to the advancement of all small business owners in the state and our membership is open

It is safe to say that the Black Women Business Owners of West Virginia was on an upward path to being a consistent and important resource for not just Black but all under-resourced small business owners in Charleston. At the start of the pandemic the BWBOofWV had

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to stop our monthly educational sessions and we were not able to put on our expo for the third year in a row where we expected more attendees and participating businesses. We have been receiving questions all year about when our meetings are going to resume.

Prior to the pandemic the BWBOofWV had the desire to establish itself formally and continue the work of bringing business resources to those who need them the most. It is our belief that the physical barrier of the COVID-19 pandemic set the group back over a year in accomplishing this sooner. It is important to consider that even without the pandemic barrier to financial resources, especially in West Virginia are very real for under-resourced communities. When this opportunity presented itself, it really helped the BWBOofWV to sit down and organize its resources in order to use this as a moment to propel ourselves successfully into the future of this organization.
